## **Against The Grain: 1980s British Cinema**

Presenting some of the most ambitious, and now, influential films and filmmakers who redefined British independent cinema who went against the grain of the 1980s.

At the beginning of the 1980s writer Colin Welland famously said "the British are coming" as he picked up his Oscar for Chariots of Fire original screenplay. They never quite arrived in the way they were expected. Instead, the industry and audience went into near terminal decline. However, amidst these turbulent times and against the political and social upheaval of Thatcherism seeds of renewal could be seen dotted across the independent film community from the arrival of Channel 4 to the rise of maverick distributor/producer Palace Pictures and the emergence of new filmmaking voices.

Made following the end of the Franco dictatorship, Carlos Saura's *Deprisa*, *deprisa* precisely portrays the nihilistic attitude of many marginalised young people during Spain's transition to democracy, a time of social unrest, high unemployment and inflation. Like Carlos Saura's 1959 debut feature *Los golfos* (*The Delinquents*,

also available), *Deprisa*, *deprisa* interrogates the theme of juvenile delinquency and was a vital contribution to Spain's *Cine Quinqui* cycle of films.

**Señora de nadie (Nobody's Wife)** (Dir: María Luisa Bemberg, Argentina, 1982 90mins) (15 Rec.)



Made under the military regime, the story of Leonor's move from a family home and a life centred on pleasing others to a desire to create a life outside "the system" was dangerously challenging to the symbolic order in place. Bemberg struggled for five years to get her script approved by censors, who saw her criticism extending from family to state, and Leonor as an

emblem of rupture. A 4K restoration, which was carried out by the digital preservation program of Argentinian titles, Recuperar, by Gotika Labs and DAC in 2018.

Yo, La Peor de Todas (I, the Worst of All) (Dir: María Luisa Bemberg, 1990 107mins) (15 Rec.)

A chronicle of the love that dare not speak its name, that of the great 17th-century Mexican poet, intellectual, and nun Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz. Presented by Cinema Mentiré as part of a year-round focus on the filmmaker. 2K restoration, made by Cinecolor Group Argentina.

## **Reframing Film**

**Badnam Basti** (Neighbourhood of Ill Repute) (Dir: Prem Kapoor, India, 1971, India, 83mins) (15 Rec.)

Originally believed lost and only recently rediscovered, Indian New Wave director Prem Kapoor's debut feature is an artfully crafted musical melodrama, which revolves around a complex love triangle between two men and a woman adapted from a novel by contemporary Indian writer Kamleshwar. The story defied norms, subtly addressing the characters'



bisexuality, a progressive theme that had to be smuggled into the narrative so to subvert the strict censorship laws of the time c/o Arsenal Distribution.
