#### Who is ideally placed to do this?


- Local context




## What works for you?

When you're having a Difficult Conversation, what do you find works and what do you find definitely doesn't work?














## What do you think of this response?

2) "They're [migrants are] just coming in and taking our resources. I've got to wait until I'm 67 instead of retiring at 60 now to get my pension...so where is my, after working all my life, my little bit of life?" - **Grimsby** 

Actually, asylum seekers barely get any help from the government (£47.39 per family member) and probably deserve more. They have really difficult lives and struggle to keep themselves and their families safe, which is all they want to do.

Also, research from the Office for Budget Responsibility suggests that higher net migration will reduce pressure on government debt, which is better for the economy.



## What about this response?


I'm really sorry to hear this, and I can see that the increase in pension age would be really frustrating and difficult.

## When opening up the conversation might not be the right thing to do...




- Personal boundaries crossed

### **Keeping safe**

- Consider your audience
- Dynamic risk assessment
  - O Who am I speaking to?
  - O Do I feel safe?
  - O Where am I having the conversation?
  - O How much personal information am I giving away?





## Some concluding points...

- 1. You should spend most of the conversation listening, questioning and probing.
- 2. Feel confident and clear about your values how can you represent them in an approachable way?
- 3. It's not only what you say, but how you say it.
- 4. Bear in mind that you may be the first person taking time to listen to them about this.
